The Art Museum at the University of Toronto is nominated for a 2019 UMAC Award of Excellence for *Figures of Sleep* and *The Night of Ideas*, 2018

(Toronto, May 7, 2019) The Art Museum at the University of Toronto is thrilled to be one of three international nominees of the **2019 UMAC Award**. The award honours excellence and innovation in university museums and collections and, most importantly, celebrates the impact of university museums and collections on their host universities (here understood as higher education institutions), their communities and contemporary society. The winner will be announced at the 19th UMAC Annual General Assembly on September 3, 2019, in Kyoto, Japan.

***Figures of Sleep*, curated by Sarah Robayo Sheridan, the Art Museum Curator**, was a major international art exhibition, paired with **Night of Ideas 2018**, an intensive all-night forum of screenings, performances and public debates on the question Is sleep in crisis? The conjoined event brought artists' existential and political concerns with sleep into dynamic dialogue with the latest scientific and humanities research into the meaning of downtime, the health impact of sleeplessness, the cultural importance of dreaming, and the architecture of the bedroom. Welcoming over 7,000 visitors, the project explored a timely subject through cross-disciplinary perspectives, shaping a new model of social engagement for a university gallery.

Figures of Sleep featured works by artists Francis Alÿs, Rebecca Belmore, Louise Bourgeois, Chris Burden, Sophie Calle, Chris Curreri,

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Peter Fischli and David Weiss, Rodney Graham, Tehching Hsieh, On Kawara, Hassan Khan, Liz Magor, Ron Mueck, Bruce Nauman, Gabriel Orozco, Jasmeen Patheja, Jon Sasaki, and Mladen Stilinović.
